Loaves and Fishes Notes

The Story of Loaves and Fishes for me is the story of migration. Most of us volunteers are migrants from colder climates, some even from overseas. Most also migrate annually for Summer pasture in our northern homes. Our bond at the pantry is part of what brings us back to Bradenton area each year. We are gladdened each time we see each other and enjoy our task together. We are bonded to our paid staffers as well and are anxious to see them each time we serve. Our bond is with our shoppers is more complicated, as we seem to get more from serving them than they get from us.

Many of the patrons at the pantry are migrants as well. The largest portion are Spanish speakers, and it helps to know a few phrases of welcome for them. A slightly smaller number of Patois speakers, but we know fewer French words for them. Of course, many are American English speakers, having migrated here from the north and west for much of the same reasons as we volunteers. A very few are native born.

We have many new clients each pantry day, and lately we have seen an increase in all categories. We are told the other pantries have made changes that account for some migration our way, but many are fresh from other lands and states as well. We believe some are in need because of the present economic and political instability. Despite the press of people, we try to welcome them by name and assist them in navigating our pantry world.

We appreciate your prayers and other support. As has been said, God does nothing except in response to prayer.

The season has passed and we are back to what's "mine is mine" and I want what's yours. Here at Our Daily Bread, the attitude is still love one another.

Our operating statement for 2018 and budgets for last year and next are included. Our receipts increase was from one large gift we received. The expenses were over budget by \$3,831, mostly from repairs in the kitchen and supplies. Our food purchases were below budget because of "12 days of Christmas" and other food drives. Our 2019 budget is a \$9,540 increase over last year. Payroll is most of the increase. If you have any questions about our financials, please call or stop in.

Turning Points Notes

As a New Year begins, I would like to thank everyone for their continuing support which makes running Turning Points such an amazing opportunity. Gauging from the number of people we are seeing in the One Stop Center now. The need in our community does not seem to be abating despite the relatively good economy. Being able to respond to people's needs which range from basic things like food and clothing, to more complicated issues like housing and healthcare propels and inspires our staff and volunteers each and every day. We can only help our community in need because of your support, so on behalf of our clients, we thank you.

Once a month Turning Points sponsors a community forum focusing on issues related to homelessness. These meetings, (People Assisting The Homeless-PATH) provide agencies, government entities, and individual volunteers with information, education and the opportunity to share ideas and best practices while networking to develop strong relationships and collaborations. At our January meeting one of the items discussed was the increase in the number of people panhandling in the past few months. There seems to be so many more people out that every major intersection appears to be covered! The challenge for those of us working to prevent and end homelessness is to help the general community understand these people are usually not homeless. They are often people who have chosen panhandling as their employment. At our PATH meeting, the discharge planner at the Manatee County Jail shared they had recently had two panhandlers who had come in recently and they claimed they were making \$1500 a week. This explains the increase in panhandlers. If they were not rewarded they would not panhandle. We are working to print more cards for people to hand out to panhandlers instead of money. The cards tell people to call 211 for help, and state they are good for a free meal at Our Daily Bread! Can you help by spreading the word? As our campaign states, "Spare change is not real change." If you really want to help the panhandlers, continue to support agencies that work to prevent their need to panhandle!

With the help of a grant from the Shelby Foundation, we have made a lot of structural changes at Turning Points recently. We have new flooring throughout our original building, a new office for the finance director, and we are re-arranging our offices to better improve client services in the Open Door and case management offices. We welcome your visit to see all our changes! Blessings to you!
